# Protecting Consumer Rights...

Ms Mamodupi Mohlala took office on 1st April 2011 as National Consumer Commissioner.

She is tasked with giving effect to South Africa's very 'toothy' Consumer Protection Act, internationally acclaimed for placing South Africans among the most protected and powerful consumers in the world.

In terms of the Act, consumers have the right to take action against conduct, in the course of production, that is 'unconscionable'.

The Act then defines 'unconscionable' as being 'unethical or improper to a degree that would shock the conscience of a reasonable person.'

Empowered by the new Consumer Protection Act, South African consumers have joined together in a Class Action against some of the worst cruelties of factory farming, where animals live and die in states of mutilation, shocking deprivation, torment and suffering.

Leading the Class Action, is *Compassion in World Farming's* **Tozie Zokufa**, former veterinary public health practitioner and meat inspector whose nine years spent in abattoirs around South Africa, convinced him that the African concept of *ina ethe* - *give and take* - must be afforded to animals too!



Says Zokufa: "I became very aware that our relationship with the animals we use for food, was out of balance.

"As things stand, we take all that we possibly can from farmed animals - while giving them only the very barest essentials to keep them alive.

"Most of the big food retailers invite consumers on a daily basis to commit moral crimes by taking advantage of consumer ignorance. With fancy jingles and pretty pictures, they invite us to buy their foodstuffs, many of which have been so cruelly produced that shoppers take refuge in 'denial', refusing to believe the truth even when one tries to enlighten them. How often have I heard: 'but that doesn't happen in this country!' or 'it can't be!'

"Yes, it happens right here in South Africa. And yes, I am offended. I am incensed. I lay the blame for the breakdown in our moral social fibre at the foot of the big corporates.

"We should all be incensed! This Class Action is about ordinary people taking back their power to live their lives ethically, responsibly and with integrity.

"Compassion in World Farming and our supporters are deeply offended and shocked by what we consider to be the unconscionable, unethical and improper treatment of animals on factory farms.

"For the purposes of this Class Action we are focusing on pigs and chickens. We have come together as a voice of protest for the 23 million laying hens and the 103 000 breeding



sows in South Africa who never see a blade of grass or a ray of sunshine in their lives and who are immobilised to a degree that they do not get to use the legs with which they were born!

"Yes. We are shocked and these practices deeply offend us."

#### FOR KIND ATTENTION:

#### COMPLAINANT:

Tozie Zokufa, Representative of Compassion in World Farming (South Africa), an NGO which represents the public interest, in accordance with Section 4 of the Consumer Protection Act.

#### CLASS ACTION COMPLAINT:

Some current methods of animal production, namely keeping female pigs in sow stalls, keeping laying hens in battery cages, destroying male chicks born into the egg industry, and causing avoidable suffering to broiler (meat) chickens, are unconscionable and unethical or improper to a degree that shocks my conscience and offends me personally, as well as the supporters of Compassion in World Farming, as reasonable people.

#### SPECIFICALLY:

#### PIGS:

The keeping of breeding sows in metal enclosures called stalls or crates that immobilize the animals, preventing any movement forwards, backwards or sideways, for four years, is unconscionable and unethical and improper to a degree that is offensive and shocking to me personally, and to the supporters of Compassion in World Farming. These sows go to slaughter without having experienced any of life's basic gifts and without having exercised even one of their natural behaviours. Even the behaviour of walking on their four legs, is taken away from them.

DESIRED OUTCOME: A phase-out, to begin immediately, of sow stalls/crates for South Africa's breeding sows in favour of group housing, as is already being practised in other parts of the world where stalls/crates are banned or are being phased out.






#### LAYING HENS:

1. The keeping of laying hens in battery cages which afford each hen, individually, a space allowance that is 75% of an A4 sheet of paper - for life - is unconscionable and unethical and improper to a degree that is offensive and shocking to me personally and to the supporters of Compassion in World Farming. In order to keep these animals in such conditions, they are debeaked, detoed and go to slaughter without having experienced any of life's basic gifts and without having exercised even one of their natural behaviours such as scratching, pecking for food, dust-bathing, sun-bathing, stretching their wings and laying their eggs in a nest. Even the ability to walk has to be relearned if they are removed from these battery cages.

DESIRED OUTCOME: A phase-out, to begin immediately, of battery cages for laying hens in favour of barn and free range production methods, as is being done in other parts of the world where bans and phase-outs are already in place.



2. The destruction of 23 million male chicks born into the egg industry annually, in macerating machines or by drowning/suffocation/exposure and/or neglect is unconscionable and unethical and improper to a degree that is offensive and shocking to me personally and to the supporters of Compassion in World Farming. This is especially unconscionable in an African context where poverty and hunger are a daily experience for so many.

DESIRED OUTCOME: Farms like Boschveld Chickens use the male chicks in poverty alleviation schemes and this example should be followed by the entire industry.



#### **BROILER (MEAT) CHICKENS:**

The keeping of broiler chickens in cramped conditions and on litter that causes foot, hock and breast burns, is unconscionable and unethical and improper to a degree that is offensive and shocking to me personally and to the supporters of Compassion in World Farming.

DESIRED OUTCOME: A free range environment for broiler chickens as already practised successfully and economically by, some SA farmers, must replace intensive chicken farming.

#### IMPACT ON HUMAN HEALTH:

Feeding impoverished communities diseased and fatty off-cuts of intensive/factory farming, in the guise of feeding the poor cheaply, is resulting in a dramatic escalation of disease and obesity in these communities, such that it is unconscionable and unethical and improper to a degree that is offensive and shocking to me personally and to the supporters of Compassion in World Farming.

DESIRED OUTCOME: Roll-out of a national programme that encourages the eating of quality meat as opposed to mass produced meat, with a greater dependence on fruit and vegetables.

# CALLING FOR REFORM

Supporters of Compassion's Class Action give their reasons...

"Viewed from an agricultural business or profit perspective it is difficult to motivate moving away from factory farming towards free range farming practices. The controlled environment of factory farming makes sense when trying to achieve economies of scale. It is easier for the farmer to expand, leading to lower prices and obvious financial benefits for both producer and consumer.

"However, as factory farming becomes increasingly refined and sophisticated, the cost to both farmer and consumer on an ethical level, is enormous. Animal welfare is something which many farmers feel forced to overlook in order to stay competitive.

"But would the consumer so readily demand cheap eggs and meat if the true conditions in broiler and battery hen houses were open for all to see? A situation has developed where the trade feels forced to protect the consumer from knowing the dirty details of the farming process in order to sell the product. Consumers on the other hand, either do not think about the farming methods, or are satisfied with as little information as possible.

"By keeping the facts of factory farming concealed, it is easy to see how low-priced battery eggs and broiler meat have almost become staple foods. The cramped and overcrowded living conditions on factory farms inhibit and distort the natural behavior of chickens in every possible way. Millions of chickens live and are processed through this system in South Africa on a weekly basis. The situation cannot improve if the people who eat them are kept in the dark about the dismal state of affairs. In effect the consumer is causing animal abuse on a massive scale without knowing about it.

"Consumers have a right and an obligation to know the

impact of their eating habits on both animal welfare and the environment."

"Compassion in World Farming's Class Action presents a call to action to put an end to institu-tionalised cruelty, which is sadly, now the accepted norm in food production.

"Central to the veterinary profession's creed is commitment to the protection of animal health and welfare; the prevention and relief of animal pain and suffering; and public education about the sentience of non-human animals. We have the knowledge and skills to recognize the physical and psychological agony experienced by millions of hens in battery farms and sows confined to crates. These methods are clearly intolerable and indeed shocking to the conscience of any reasonable person.

"There is an overwhelming body of scientific evidence demonstrating the complex emotional lives of animals, their advanced sensory and motor development, capacity for feeling pain and pleasure, and sophisticated communication skills, that leaves no doubt regarding the sentience of animals.

"When animals suffer, we suffer with them. The misery we have inflicted on our domestic animals is reflected in the society in which we live. We can no longer allow the abuse of animals to continue by imposing outdated, unconscionable farming methods.

"The public need to know and understand that they are supporting and encouraging animal maltreatment on a massive scale.

"When compassionate methods of farming are implemented, it will also be a small step towards regaining our human dignity."

## Factory farming is a reflection of dysfunctionality in humankind...

Gauteng Businesswoman Khomotso Mogale says: "Inhumane methodologies of farming are a reflection of dysfunctionality in humankind. We are mostly not enlightened about issues of animal welfare and the implications of inhumane farming methodologies on our health. With insight, I have no doubt South Africans will exercise their right to object."

"I've been vegan for just over a year and ethics was the Number 1 reason for this. After being exposed to the way animals are treated in

factory farms, it was unconscionable for me to be part of the torture and cruelty.

"If it is so okay to eat animals and their products, then parents should be willing to let their children go on a field trip to an abattoir or a hatchery. There are very few parents who would let this happen yet they happily feed their kids products from these cruel industries.

"We have to teach consumers that animals and their products are luxuries not necessities. You can live a fulfilled and wonderful life full of tasty things to eat, from plants and plant-based things.

"You don't need to participate in the torture that is factory farming to LIVE. We also need to force farmers to find ways to treat animals with respect and dignity and still make a profit and add to the economy."

## CALLING FOR REFORM Supporters of Compassion's Class Action give their reasons...



**Dr Elisa Galgut**, lecturer in Philosophy at the University of Cape Town. has made this appeal to Commissioner Mohlala:

"I am trying to think of reasons to persuade you that the abominations of factory farming should be outlawed.

"But are reasons alone sufficient? Can you, using mere argument,

persuade the racist that apartheid was a crime against humanity? Can the anti-semite be persuaded that the Nazi death camps were horrors of stupefying proportions? Reason must be tempered with compassion in moral judgement and action.

"Anyone with an ounce of pity knows that confining sentient beings in cramped cages and depriving them of fundamental needs is morally obscene. How can one deny such a claim, and still consider oneself a human being? Cruelty - despite being supported by powerful

interest groups - has no place in decent society.

"Indeed, treating animals as though they were mere 'things' is a symptom of the most profound irrationality. a kind of madness. The decisions you make will affect the lives of millions of intelligent, sentient beings, who are currently subjected to unimaginable cruelty. You have the power to change that.

"Just as the overthrowing of apartheid seemed radical until it happened, so the liberation of factory-farmed animals from their prisons will seem inevitable as soon as it is done. We are bound together as human beings in virtue of our shared compassion; it is within these bounds of enlightened morality that I write to you and urge you no longer to allow the brutalities of factory farming to stain our society."



#### Marlise Richter:

PhD Candidate in Public Health, Wits University (South Africa) and University of Ghent (Belgium):

### Public Health arguments against Factory Farming

"There are overwhelming public health rationales for putting an end to factory

farming and the inhumane treatment of animals. The most persuasive and scientifically rigorous piece I have recently read comes from a document entitled 'A Please for sustainable livestock farming - an end to organised irresponsibility' (2010).

"This document was written by more than a 100 Dutch professors who summarise the overwhelming public health evidence for putting a stop to factory farming now. The document states: 'Never before in history have we spent such a small fraction (less than 10%) of our family income on food. And never before has the production of food had such an enormous impact on our environment. The cost of food has decreased. The price is being paid by animals, nature and the environment and thus, in time, by us and future generations.'

"The scientists point out that animals have been bred to yield higher outputs than ever before: in the last 25

years, 25% more eggs per hen, 40% more growth per animal and 40% more milk per cow have been attained. This has had devastating effects not only on animal health, well-being and happiness, but also on human beings.

"Modern diets that are meat-intensive mean that people are consuming increased amounts of saturated fat. These are linked to increased cardiovascular diseases, colon cancer, obesity and diabetes and other illnesses.

"The intensive use of antibiotics and chemotherapeutics to try and offset the unnatural crowded living conditions of animals, are exceedingly bad for people's health. Pathogenic agents such as Q-fever, MRSA, ESBL-bacteria and other pathogens have also made humans victims. In contrast, vegetarians and vegans weigh less than meat-eaters and are generally more healthy. Public health evidence is clear: factory farming is harmful to your health."

### Leading Animal Scientist supports Compassion's 'Consumer Rebellion'



Animal Scientist, KZN cattle farmer and author, **Dr André Mentz**, has given his full support to *Compassion in World Farming's* official complaint to the Consumer Commission. "For years now, I have done everything possible to convince SA's agricultural authorities to farm with nature, not against nature, but to no avail. Your consumer rebellion is fully justified and I support it," he told Animal Voice's deputy editor, Tozie Zokufa.

Dr Mentz, whose book *The Holistic Alternative* roundly rejects the intensification of animal production, believes that the basic principle of all livestock production is about converting pasture into live mass.

He explained "For example, cattle, as ruminants, are created to live only off grass and in doing so, to produce the best quality meat. The drastically unnatural methods used by feedlot managers to change a herbivore's physiology to function like a mono-gastric animal, are outrageous, and a blatant violation of ethical norms. It is a sin against God's creation."

Dr Mentz added that prior to the introduction of feedlots, where cattle are forced to eat grain for quick fattening, environmental

problems like pollution, greenhouse gasses and unhealthy red meat were unknown to the industry.

"It is unbelievable that all the appeals from governments, and numerous organizations at national and international level, to conserve electricity, to conserve water, to prevent pollution, greenhouse gasses

"I challenge anyone to give one reason to justify the existence of feedlots in this country. Feedlot production is in the hands of people who view animals as having no value beyond their ability to produce the highest output at the lowest cost. It is not an agricultural business; it is an industrialised operation. Something is terribly wrong when agricultural practices become an extermination of nature."

Dr Mentz predicted that the new Consumer Act would generate a lot of 'fireworks'. "It seems to be the only way to bring about change in animal farming, and, the sooner the better," he said.

He says: "There are mainly three things that make the existence of a feedlot industry unacceptable anywhere in the world. The first revolves around the extent of permanent pollution of the total ecology of a feedlot. Secondly, all the favourable healthy aspects of red meat are counteracted by the diet of concentrate (containing unacceptable additives). In the third place, feedlots tend to rape all of the ethical norms relating to the housing and treatment of cattle."

Therefore, in all our projects in which we have assisted emerging farmers we have ensured that all facilities and education have complied with the highest animal welfare standards. We also have a full ethics committee in our Department who are responsible for assuring the welfare of our state-owned herds and all animals used by the Department for research projects.

As the Provincial Departments are unfortunately not mandated to uphold the Animal Protection Act, we suggest that you make your concerns known to the National Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries. Consumer pressure is, however, the strongest force available to induce farmers to adopt good welfare practices and so we urge you to continue to increase public awareness by providing them with factually correct and in-context information.
